Legal Profession

Elements of Expertise: Lawyers’ Impact on Civil Trial and Hearing Outcomes

Methodologically innovative, comprehensive meta-analysis of extant studies of the impact of lawyer representation on the outcomes of civil trials and hearings. Studies comprise more than 74,000 adjudicated civil cases in 10 different fields of law.

Findings cited in *amicus curiae* briefs for Parrish v. Romfeldt-Mendoza (Wisconsin Court of Appeals) and King v. King (Court of Appeals of the State of Washington), and in testimony to the Committee

on the Judiciary of the United States Senate (Statement of Rebekah Diller, Deputy Director, Justice Program Brennan Center for Justice at NYU School of Law, May 28, 2008).

Debt and Aspiration: Sources of Lawyers for the Public

Examines the sources of lawyers who work for the public in public service, public interest and direct service positions, looking particularly at the role of educational debt in shaping legal careers. Uses data from the After the JD Survey of legal careers, the first nationally representative longitudinal survey of American lawyers.

Inequality among the Highly Paid: Professional Self-Regulation and Demographic Opportunism (1st author, with Jane K. Ohgami, Stanford PhD student)

Investigates the impact on earnings inequality *within professions* of two distinct professional powers of self-regulation: professional occupations' ability to control who enters the occupation and professions' capacity to regulate competition within the occupation. Uses data from the United States Current Population Surveys and follows 40 occupations over a period of 35 years.

Access to Justice

Civil Justice and Social Class Inequality: The Socio-economic Impact of Civil-Law Problems

Investigates how experiences with civil justice problems affect social class inequality. Follows people's justice problems through their "life histories" to the consequences they create for those who experience them. Uses data from the 2004 England and Wales Civil and Social Justice Survey, a nationally representative survey of public experience with civil justice problems and events.

Distinct and Unequal: Civil Justice and Socioeconomic Inequality (book)

Conventional wisdom holds that Americans are highly litigious and that lawyers are the gatekeepers of access to justice. A further tenet of convention is that, if access to justice is unequal, this is because lawyers' services are too expensive. In fact, however, Americans seldom think of their civil justice problems as "legal," and rarely take such problems to lawyers or courts. Substantial social class inequality exists in how people handle justice problems and in the consequences they encounter as a result of those troubles. Studying how Americans really handle their justice problems reveals a troubling finding and a surprising suggestion for social policy. Civil justice problems are engines of social inequality: their negative consequences disproportionately affect working class and poor Americans. To equalize access to justice, at least as important as greater access to lawyers is the expansion of *non-legal* sources of remedy. Data sources include a two-city focus group study of public experience with common civil justice troubles.
