The Chinese Language Program at Stanford and Peking University

Coordinator/Director: Stanford Language Center, Asian Summer Language Program

Grade Level: High school student applications accepted only for Stanford portion of the program

Dates of Program: June 21 – July 22, 2010 (Stanford Portion)

Application Deadline: March 1- Contact Language Center

Cost: Tuition approximately \$6,950, plus room and board. See the Chinese Summer Language Program web site at <https://www.stanford.edu/dept/lc/language/courses/asianSummer/stanfordPekingOverview.html>

Intensive Chinese at first-, second-, and third-year levels. The high school program is equal to two quarters of Chinese language instruction, since high school students cannot attend the portion of the program held in China.

The Stanford-Beijing program combines an intensive five-week language program at Stanford University with a four-week practicum in Chinese at Peking University. Classes meet for four hours of class instruction daily, Monday through Friday. High school students may attend the Stanford portion only, June 21 – July 22.

The East Palo Alto Stanford Academy (EPASA) offers an exciting two-year long learning opportunity for seventh- and eighth-grade students in the Ravenswood City School District.

EPASA challenges young people to learn with an academically enriching program to complement and enhance the curriculum offered by the District. EPASA also works to ensure a successful transition from middle school to high school by empowering its students with increased social awareness, as well as the skills and strategies needed to effectively pursue educational opportunities in a high school outside of their community.

During the school year (October-May), EPASA offers a Saturday program from 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. consisting of:

- ❖ Project-based math and language arts curriculum in the morning
- ❖ One-on-one tutoring with a Stanford student from 12-2 p.m.
- ❖ Workshops with a focus on practical skills, as well as cultural education
- ❖ Occasional field trips.

Students enrolling in the school year program continue to meet for the summer. During the summer program (June-July), EPASA offers a five-week session that consists of:

- ❖ Morning classes in math and English

- ◆ Elective courses (e.g. language, art, dance, history, etc.)

Residential Programs

Cost: Varies by session. Limited financial aid is available for the EPGY Summer Institutes.

The EPGY Summer Institutes are two- to four-week residential programs for academically talented and motivated middle and high-school students. The Summer Institutes provide an opportunity for these students to enrich and accelerate their academic pursuits and to meet others who share their interests and abilities. Participants are enrolled in a single intensive-study course, taught by a Stanford instructor, and covering topics not typically presented at their grade level.

Summer Institutes High School Program (Ages 13-17)

The Summer Institutes High School Program consists of two sessions at Stanford University. Subject areas include arts and humanities, business, computer science, engineering, legal studies, mathematics, social science, physical and biological science and writing. Past EPGY Summer Institutes participants have come from 60 countries and 49 states, and students leave with a sense of academic accomplishment, new friends, and fond memories of a wonderful time spent at Stanford University.

However, students are housed by gender, rather than subject area, and the courses are designed specifically for academically talented and motivated middle-school students.

High School Summer College

Grade Level: Current High School Juniors and Seniors

Dates of Program: June 19 – August 15, 2010

Application Deadline: Apply by May 2, 2010 for the residential program
By June 6, 2010 for the commuter program

Cost: Costs vary according to units taken; scholarships are available

Stanford's High School Summer College provides academic, social and intellectual opportunities that cannot be found in a high school classroom. You will have the chance to take challenging courses while interacting with students and scholars from around the world. You have the opportunity to earn Stanford University credit while taking advantage of the exciting scholarly resources available to members of the Stanford community. At the same time, you can sample the unique entertainment and outdoor recreation activities on campus and in the culturally rich San Francisco Bay Area. These diverse and interesting academic and extracurricular offerings provide many occasions for personal growth, enjoyment and the opportunity to develop memorable friendships. We invite you to join us for Summer 2010.

Our selective eight-week program attracts exceptional high school students who are eager to experience a true university environment. Current high juniors and seniors are eligible to apply; applications from accomplished and mature high school sophomores will also be considered. Students must be at least age 16 by the start of the academic quarter.

- ❖ Participants explore the sciences, humanities, arts, and languages.
- ❖ Stanford admission officers meet with program participants to discuss the college application process.
- ❖ Success Series workshops are available to help with college application preparation and transitioning to a university setting.
- ❖ Credits earned in High School Summer College may be eligible for transfer to another college or university.
- ❖ Students have full access to Stanford's premium athletic facilities and libraries.
- ❖ Partial scholarships are available for the residential program.

Residential Program

High School Summer College students enroll in the eight-week quarter and take undergraduate courses for Stanford University credit. Participants reside in the historic Florence Moore Hall with a trained staff of residence mentors. Residential students must register for at least eight units of course work. High School Summer College students gain an inside view of college life and begin to develop the social and study skills needed to meet the challenges that face college students.

Commuter Program

Students who live within a manageable commuting distance to the Palo Alto campus may enroll as commuter students. Only residential students are eligible to participate in the numerous planned social and educational activities that take place on and off campus throughout the summer. Commuter students must register for at least three units of course work.

Pre-College Math Institute (PCMI)

Coordinator/Director: Noe Lozano

Grade Level: Grades 6 – 8

Dates of Program: Late June – Early August

PCMI is a program designed to teach basic math and algebra to a diverse group of 6th, 7th, and 8th graders while introducing them to a university environment. Students are taught using “hands-on” and “minds-on” approaches to mathematics based upon the idea that math is in our everyday environment. The faculty and staff who run the institute teach students study skills including time management, self-motivation, discipline, and organizational strategies.

This program is teacher directed and includes field trips, motivational speakers, lab tours, swimming, and other fun activities.

PCMI is six weeks long beginning in June and ending in August. It takes place on Stanford campus with about 125 students (Note: Stanford chooses 10 students from outside of the district). Ninety-five percent of the funding for this program is provided from Redwood City School District and five percent is from Stanford in-kind and corporate gifts.

School of Earth Sciences High School Internships

Grade Level: High School (Local schools only)

Dates of Program: June-August

Application Deadline: Late March, 2010

Cost: No fee. Non-residential program

The School of Earth Sciences summer intern program provides local high school students the opportunity to learn about and observe first-hand the activities and steps involved in scientific research. Each internship position is different. Interns work with one research group, and often on just one project, primarily in one of the Geological and Environmental Sciences Department laboratories.

A mentor is assigned to each intern as a guide for the summer. Mentors may be graduate students, laboratory managers, post-doctoral fellows, or professors. Together, mentor and intern set up a semi-regular schedule for between 15 and 30 volunteer hours per week. Work is mostly during weekdays, but occasionally interns work on weekends.

Interns meet together weekly for talks, lab tours, and field trips. The weekly meetings also provide them with the opportunity to learn about the broad field of Earth Science and get to know one another.

Stanford College Prep

Cost: All services listed are provided free of charge to participants. Students interested in applying to the program must meet the criteria below.

Stanford College Prep (formerly Upward Bound) is a four-year academic program that challenges local high school students to develop the skills, study habits, discipline, and attitude necessary to be successful in high school and college. Participants come from diverse backgrounds, and are typically first-generation college-bound students. The program offers year-round comprehensive guidance and academic support to help students meet the challenge of preparing for higher education. Participants are matched with Stanford students who provide weekly tutoring at East Palo Alto Academy High School, or mentoring for high school juniors and seniors during drop-in hours at the Haas Center.

Stanford College Prep currently serves seniors from the Sequoia Union and East Palo Alto High School Districts. Our freshman, sophomore, and junior students all come from East Palo Alto Academy High School.

The summer residential program is open to students who have participated in the academic year component. The purpose of the summer residential program is to expose students to college life while they are in high school. Students take college preparation courses and live in residence halls on the Stanford campus for five weeks each summer. Participants also:

- ❖ Receive academic, personal and career counseling
- ❖ Take two college-preparatory courses
- ❖ Learn about the college and university admission process

- ❖ Attend recreational and educational field trips
- ❖ Participate in personal, cultural, and leadership development activities
- ❖ Engage in community service
- ❖ Develop effective study habits

Stanford Institutes of Medicine Summer Research Program

Grade Level: High School Juniors and Seniors

Dates of Program: June 14 – August 6, 2010

Application Deadline: *2010 Program closed. Information is for 2011 program only.*

Cost: No cost to participants. Non-residential program.

SIMR is an 8-week summer internship program open to high school juniors and seniors. The program consists of hands-on research under the direct guidance of a one-on-one mentor at a top class lab within the Institutes of Medicine at Stanford University. The five Institutes include: ITI (Immunity, Transplantation and Infection), Stem Cell Institute, Institute of Neuroscience, Cardiovascular Institute and Cancer Biology.

Students learn about basic laboratory techniques including safety, learn the basics in the field they are studying (like stem cells or neuroscience) and gathering, analyzing and presenting scientific data. In addition, the students make scientific connections with faculty, students and postdoctoral fellows.

During the majority of the summer, students will participate in lab work in their assigned lab. In addition, all students will participate in the following:

- ❖ Institute specific lectures which will meet twice a week for most of the summer
- ❖ Core SIMR lectures from guest speakers
- ❖ Safety training sessions during the first and second weeks
- ❖ Seminars on career choices, college admissions
- ❖ Field trip to a local biotech company
- ❖ Poster session at the end of the program where students will present their work to their families and the Stanford community. A presentation will also be given within each Institute group.

SJW's Jazz Camp provides a fun, focused, and supportive environment where young musicians study and play and sing with motivated peers and a prestigious faculty of professional musicians and educators. Jazz Camp curriculum emphasizes ear-training, improvisation, and playing in small combos. Students are evaluated and placed into classes and combos with other musicians at their level. The Jazz Camp experience includes master classes, small ensemble playing, private lessons, and performance opportunities, as well as theory, musicianship, and jazz history instruction. Each week of Jazz Camp culminates in a festive public recital by student combos.

JAZZ RESIDENCY

SJW's Jazz Residency is a rewarding and enjoyable weeklong immersion in jazz designed for adult musicians, emerging professionals, and music educators. The SMYSP Summer Residential Program (SRP) is an annual science and medicine-based enrichment program open to low-income and ethnically disadvantaged high school sophomores and juniors who live in northern and central California. The program guides 24 ethnically diverse students through a five-week summer program held on Stanford University's campus.

The program bolsters student's science skills while introducing them to a host of health-related careers including physician, medical researcher, pharmacist, etc. In addition, Summer Residential Program participants receive one-on-one and group college admissions counseling, SAT preparation workshops, essay and resume writing guidance, presentation skills and PowerPoint training.

Stanford University professors, staff, and medical personnel participate in the program. A full-time staff of ten Stanford undergraduate students directs the program and lives with the SMYSP participants during the five-week program.

*Qualifications

- ❖ Currently a sophomore or junior in high school who lives and attends school in one of the following northern or central California counties: Alameda, Contra Costa, Fresno, Madera, Marin, Mendocino, Merced, Monterey, Napa, Sacramento, San Benito, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Solano, Sonoma, Stanislaus, and Yolo. (NO exceptions.) Preference is given to students who are juniors.
- ❖ Are from a low-income family, and/or a family with little or no history of attending college.

- ❖ Have demonstrated interest in science classes and have received a B-average in some of them.
- ❖ Demonstrate an interest in medicine- and health-related careers, and show maturity, intelligence, initiative and curiosity about the world around you.

The Stanford National Forensic Institute is a national caliber summer forensics program. The SNFI sessions offer flexible and unique programs including one-, three-, and four-week policy debate programs; two- and three-week Lincoln Douglas programs; a two-week Individual Events program, and a one-week parliamentary debate session. Individualized curricula designed for a variety of skill levels are offered to insure that all students receive a challenging and academically appropriate experience. Students can also choose from a variety of special programs designed to fit the needs of every competitor. SNFI provides serious students of debate the opportunity to interact with some of the finest and most renowned forensics instructors in the nation. SNFI is an independent program held in the residence hall facilities of Stanford University. The program is sponsored by the Stanford Debate Society, which is a non-profit student organization at Stanford.

Policy Debate – The Stanford National Forensic Institute offers debate programs for students of any level of experience. The Three Week programs are open to all students and provide comprehensive preparation for the upcoming year of competitive policy debate. The SNFI Policy camp offers a three week program with two main options: the “Accelerated Policy Program” and the “Core Policy Program” as well as a fourth week “Intensive Practice Round Session.” Students may attend either the Accelerated or Core program and be qualified to stay on for the fourth week Intensive Practice Round Session. Special Programs within the three week camp include the “Swing Lab” for students who will be attending their second Policy Debate camp of this summer and a Sophomore Scholars lab for rising stars.

Lincoln Douglas Debate – A two-week program for students of any level of experience, the Lincoln Douglas program offers comprehensive preparation for the upcoming year of competitive debate. Each lab is carefully constructed to maximize

student's ability to accelerate their skills in a highly educational environment. A strong student to staff ratio (7:1) and a minimum of 10 expertly critiqued practice rounds are a core feature of the two-week camp. The Three Week program adds an additional week to the standard Two Week program. The Third Week focuses on technique and practice rounds, and gives students the chance to fully integrate the skills they have learned during the first two weeks of camp.

Individual Events – Our challenging curriculum ensures that speakers starting out their forensic careers will learn the basic skills necessary to become competitive immediately while providing them with a firm foundation for growth. Experienced speakers will master advanced techniques to improve their performances and make them more successful at local, state and national competitions.

Public Forum Debate – The SNFI treats Public Forum as the distinct event it is, with a unique curriculum. The program is divided into three one-week sessions that are organized progressively:

Week one is a special focus program for beginners and early-intermediate students only, which allows the whole group to accomplish rapid academic progress, while moving at a comfortable instructional pace and with a friendly and nurturing atmosphere.

Week two is the main session, with enrollment likely capped at around 40 students due to space considerations.

Week three is a supplemental program focused primarily on practice rounds. In addition to practice rounds, several special topics appropriate for rising varsity level students shall be covered, such as advanced strategy and extensive consideration of advanced crossfire and cross-ex techniques.

Parliamentary Debate – The Stanford Parliamentary Debate program returns this summer. Serious students of parliamentary debate wanting to take their activity to the next level are encouraged to attend, as are those just beginning in this style of argumentation. A special advanced section is planned for this summer. Small group activities ensure that students of all experience levels can be accommodated.

SUMaC's goals include bringing mathematically talented and motivated high-school students from across the United States and from around the world to Stanford University for four weeks of serious mathematical pursuits. SUMaC provides access for these students to advanced topics in mathematics in a way that is fun and interesting. It leads these students through topics that are of great significance in the historical development of mathematics, that are important to current lines of mathematical research, and that have applications in the sciences. SUMaC provides a friendly social environment for interaction between SUMaC participants and Stanford Mathematics Department faculty and students.

SUMaC includes an intensive course in higher mathematics and a guided research project that allows students to individually pursue a focused area of interest, related to the course. A guest lecture series covering a range of topics, given by internationally known research mathematicians, is also included. In addition, SUMaC facilitates group problem-solving sessions, individual tutoring, social events and outings, on-campus housing and dining, plus access to campus athletic and library facilities.

SUMMARY OF MINORS' WORK REGULATIONS & WORK PERMITS

Labor laws generally prohibit non-farm employment of children younger than 14. Special rules apply to agricultural work, domestic work and the entertainment industry.

Minors younger than 16 years are allowed to work only in limited, specified occupations.

Minors under the age of 18 may not work in environments declared hazardous or dangerous for young workers, as listed on reverse of California Department of Education Form B1-1, "Statement of Intent to Employ Minor and Request for Work Permit."

A day of rest from work is required if the total hours worked per week exceed 30 or if more than 6 hours are worked on any one day during the week.

Child labor laws do not generally apply to minors who deliver newspapers or work at odd jobs, such as yard work and baby-sitting, or in private homes where the minor is not regularly employed.

FORMS REQUIRED FOR EMPLOYMENT OF MINORS:

The forms required for the employment of minors are supplied by the State to the school districts. Two forms are required:

- 1) Request for Work Permit and Statement of Intent to Employ Minor (form B1-1 or B1S-1)
- 2) Permit to Employ and Work (B1-4)

Work regulations for minors are summarized on the reverse side of the Request for Work Permit and Statement of Intent to Employ Minor form.

TO OBTAIN A WORK PERMIT:

- ❖ The minor/student, after obtaining a promise of employment, must obtain the “Statement of Intent to Employ Minor and Request for Work Permit” (form B1-1 or BIS-1) from the school/school district. A school may never issue a blank work permit before the student has a promise of employment.
- ❖ The Statement of Intent to Employ Minor and Request for Work Permit must be filled in completely, including the signatures of a parent or legal guardian, employer, and the name of the workers’ compensation carrier.
- ❖ After all the information is completed by the student, employer and parent, a school official issues the Permit to Employ and Work (form B1-4). A copy of the work permit should be kept on file at the school for 3 years.
- ❖ The student gives the permit to his/her employer to retain for 3 years.

Work permits are issued for individual, specific employers. Each time a student changes jobs, a new work permit must be issued.

If a student works two jobs, both jobs together may not total more than the legal number of hours specified for each age group and circumstance.

If an employer is covered by both state and federal laws, the higher standard—the provision which gives the most protection to employees—applies.

HOURS OF WORK

Ages 16 – 17 *When school is not in session:* May work up to 48 hours per week but no more than 8 hours in any one day. Work must be performed no earlier than 5 a.m. or later than 10 p.m. except that work may extend to 12:30 a.m. on nights preceding non-school days.

Ages 14 – 15 *When school is not in session:* Daily maximum 8 hours and weekly maximum 40 hours. Work must be performed no earlier than 7 a.m. nor later than 7 p.m. any day of the week. From June 1 to Labor Day work hours may be extended to 9 p.m.

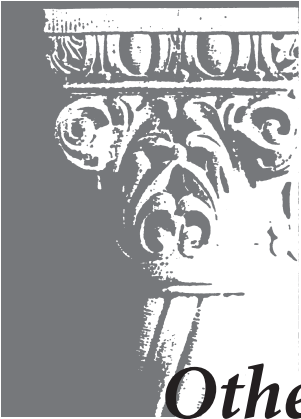

VOLUNTEER TIPS FOR PARENTS:

- ❖ Get your child excited about serving his/her community.
- ❖ Make sure your child really wants to volunteer.
- ❖ Treat volunteering as serious and hold your child accountable for his/her commitment.
- ❖ Ask questions about supervision where your child is volunteering.
- ❖ Support your child by showing interest in what he/she is doing.
- ❖ Reflect with your child about his/her experience while volunteering.
- ❖ Set an example, volunteer yourself, or volunteer with your child or as a family.
- ❖ Allow your child to call the agency.
- ❖ Encourage your child to ask questions; talk about them before the call.
- ❖ Don't commit your child without his/her full agreement and enthusiasm.

VOLUNTEER TIPS FOR KIDS

- ❖ Think about what activities you like before you call an agency.
- ❖ Plan or practice what you will say before you call the agency.
- ❖ Ask specifically about what kind of tasks you will be doing.
- ❖ Go prepared to work and give something of yourself.
- ❖ Call as soon as possible if you cannot meet your commitment.
- ❖ Don't feel pushed into volunteering to do something you don't think you will enjoy just because you made an inquiry to an agency.
- ❖ Don't sign-up for too many hours, especially at first.
