- He composed a motet entitled *Jesus and the Traders* as well as such choral pieces as *Norwegian Girls*. Nazi occupiers banned the performance of the *Peacock Variations*, from this man's suite about a Napoleonic soldier, and his other nationalistic works include the *Psalmus (*) Hungaricus*. For 10 points— name this composer of Hary Janos who collaborated on folk song collecting with Béla Bartók.**

answer: Zoltán Kodály
- One person who held this post was the grandson and namesake of the 1860s minister to England and unsuccessful Free Soil Party Vice Presidential candidate, Charles Francis Adams. Also held by the unfortunate (*) Abel Upshur, its notable Civil War occupant was Gideon Wells. Prior to becoming the first Secretary of Defense, James Forrestal had this job. For 10 points— name this former Cabinet-level position.**

answer: Secretary of the Navy
- After hearing that Oskar Rose is going to the Marianas, one character in this play sees the naked ghost of King Solomon. In the opening scene, the *Kreutzer Sonata* is being played on the violin, and later the family of Johann (*) Mobius arrives. Richard Voss tries to investigate a strangled nurse at Mathilde von Zahnd's sanatorium, suspecting two men who pretend to be Einstein, in, for 10 points— what play by Friedrich Durenmatt?**

answer: *The Physicists* or *Die Physiker*
- The green tiger Yaguarogui does this in Bolivian myth, while the Ainu claim that Kamui sent a heroic crow to prevent a devil from doing this. Rahu and Ketu try to do this in Hinduism, and Nut does this on a (*) nightly basis in Egyptian myth. One of the events that will kick off Ragnarok is Skoll doing this. For 10 points— name this activity which Chinese myth believes dragons engage in to cause eclipses.**

answer: eating the sun (accept clear equivalents; prompt on destroying the sun or similar answers)
- Evidence for this theory includes the results of deep inelastic scattering experiments, and among the non-perturbative approaches to it is a lattice variant invented by Ken Wilson. It is described by the (*) SU(3) symmetry group and forms the underlying basis for the Eightfold Way, and Wilczek, Gross, and Politzer received a Nobel Prize for discovering its distinguishing feature, asymptotic freedom. For 10 points— name this physical theory which uses gluons to describe the strong interaction between quarks.**

answer: quantum chromodynamics

6. **She alludes to "a waterfall in slow motion" and includes such tracks as the Bee Gees cover "Inside and Out" on her most recent album. Formerly a guitarist for Broken Social Scene, this creator of (*) *Let it Die* and *The Reminder* proclaims "money can't buy you back the love that you had then" in a 2007 song. For 10 points— name this singer who rhymes "tell me that you love me more" with the title of her "1234."**

answer: Leslie Feist

7. **In one of his more enigmatic deaths, this man was known by the codename "C-2." In January 2008, he was killed in the guise of a Libyan-born figure accused of the 2007 Bagram attack. At another time, he confessed to (*) beheading Daniel Pearl. Hamza Rabi, Saif al-Adel, and Khalid Sheikh Mohammed are among his many identities. For 10 points— name this position occupied by seven killed or captured terrorist suspects.**

answer: Al Qaeda Number 3 (accept clear equivalents)

8. **Its temperature dependence is governed by the length of threonine-glycine repeats on a certain protein. Its relation to foraging and feeding is controlled by neuropeptide Y. (*) Light-dependent degradation of TIM makes entry of PER-TIM dimers into the nucleus impossible, and transcription continues. Governed in mammals by the suprachiasmatic nuclei, it is lost via mutated *clock* genes. For 10 points— name this biological cycle.**

answer: circadian rhythms

9. **Bill Wyman nearly did this by marriage in 1993, and a novelty song covered by the Grateful Dead tells of a man who did this saying "it sounds funny I know, but it really is so." This action notably leaves a character without delta brain waves after engaging in it in (*) Roswell, New Mexico with Mildred while time-travelling. For 10 points— Fry on *Futurama* performs what paradoxical act on his family tree?**

answer: becoming his own grandfather (accept obvious equivalents)

10. **For the first two years of its rule, this group hid the identities of its leaders, using names such as "Brother Number Three" and the Angka. Ta Mok led a coup to gain control of this group in 1997, eighteen years after it lost power due to a (*) Vietnamese invasion following its uneasy alliance with Norodom Sihanouk. For 10 points— name this Pol Pot-led group which instigated a reign of terror in Cambodia.**

answer: the Khmer Rouge

11. **Jacob Zwarts identified one figure in this painting as Miguel de Barrios, a Spanish *converso* who formed an alliance with the Moroccan sugar heiress also depicted. That man wears a floppy black hat above his long, curly hair, and the woman wears several (*) bracelets and a flowing orange dress, while the man's right hand appears to be feeling her up. For 10 points— name this painting by Rembrandt of a Sephardic couple.**

answer: *The Jewish Bride*

12. **It concludes with a song that proclaims "businessmen never rob banks" and "perfume can cover a stench/That's what I learned from the French." Including the numbers "I'd Give My (*) Life for You," "The American Dream," and "I Still Believe," it was the next musical composed after *Les Misérables* by Claude-Michel Schönberg. For 10 points— name this musical about an American soldier and his Vietnamese lover.**

answer: *Miss Saigon*

13. **Some of the last areas to join this group were admitted via the Convention of Gastein, and the Heppenheim program and the Vormärz movements attempted to democratize this organization. Governed by a (*) Bundesrat, it implemented the ideas of Friedrich List. Members adopted the metric system and the Vereinsthaler currency. For 10 points, name this economic union, a precursor to German unification.**

answer: the Zollverein

14. **This novel includes a Brazilian Zionist who carries a machine gun to his bartending job. One character in this novel has a glass eye that also functions as a watch. The world of (*) Vheissu is discovered by Hugh Godolphin in this book, whose title character appears as the Bad Priest and is thought to live in the sewers by Herbert Stencil. For 10 points— Benny Profane appears in what Thomas Pynchon novel with a one-letter title?**

answer: V

15. **One athlete of this name used a martini glass to kick off in the 1989 Pro Bowl; though he spent a decade with Detroit, his best year may have been as a member of the 1993 Super Bowl champion (*) Cowboys. Another athlete of this name was a switch hitter and the most recent member of the 3000-hit, 500-home run club, who joined Gary Carter in the 2003 Hall of Fame class. For 10 points— name this Orioles power hitter.**

answer: Eddie Murray

16. **The first attempt to test this phenomenon in humans involved stopping a harsh noise by solving button-pressing puzzles, after it was first tested on animals using a floor with a divider short enough to jump over. It was first discovered by (*) electrically shocking dogs by Martin Seligman. For 10 points— name this model for explaining depression that involves past failures causing subjects to give up.**

answer: learned helplessness

17. **In 2008, this country's health minister was fired after 300 million dollars went missing. In 2007, it elected the governor of Katsina and leader of the People's Democratic Party as its new president. (*) Umaru Yar'Adua replaced Olusegun Obasanjo, who returned the country to civilian rule in 1999 after the death of Sani Abacha. For 10 points— name this country whose economy relies on e-mail scams.**

answer: Nigeria

18. **In the manufacture of ceramics, these compounds are used in the Pechini process together with a polyhydroxy alcohol. They are used as eluants in the ion-exchange band displacement method of rare earth separation. Their namesake effect relates to their increasing (*) stability to the larger number of ring closures, and examples of agents that form them include EDTA, a polydentate ligand. For 10 points— name these coordination compounds consisting of central metal atoms enclosed in a cyclic structure.**

answer: chelates

19. **One of its first uses in Europe was to depict a soldier who is insulted by a baker and resolves to kill himself in *None But the Brave* by Arthur Schnitzler. Perhaps invented by (*) Édouard Dujardin, it is also used to reflect on the life of Granny Weatherall by Katherine Anne Porter. For 10 points— give this literary term, coined by William James, which is used in *The Waves* by Virginia Woolf and Joyce's *Ulysses*.**

answer: stream of consciousness

20. **Her criticism of European playwrights was published as *The Social Significance of the Modern Drama*, and this editor of (*) *Mother Earth* also wrote about the Kronstadt rebellion, which she saw firsthand, in *My Disillusionment in Russia*. This former partner of would-be assassin Alexander Berkman was in Russia because she had been deported in the Red Scare. For 10 points— name this anarchist.**

answer: Emma Goldman

21. **Those who are not allowed to practice this are known as "muqallids" or "imitators" because they are bound by "taqlid." Methods such as qiyas, or analogy, and ijma, or consensus, were once ways to do it. Sunnis have declared since the fourth Islamic century that the (*) "gates" of this are closed, though Shia still recognize "mujtahids." For 10 points— name this practice of putting forth new interpretations of Sharia law.**

answer: ijtihad

22. **Presaging *Pygmalion*, the hero of this novel turns a beggar into a society woman, though his friends react with horror. The title character scams women into telling secrets to (*) Cadwallader Crabtree, who pretends to be a fortune teller, and is imprisoned after writing a satire against Steady Steerwell. Ultimately all ends well when the hero marries Emilia Gauntlet. For 10 points— name this novel by Tobias Smollett.**

answer: *The Adventures of Peregrine Pickle, in Which Are Included Memories of a Lady of Quality*

23. **The peak capacity associated with this technique can be given as the time-integral of the theoretical plate number, and the dispersion that occurs can be given by the Golay equation. The Van Deetmer equation is used to model this process, which uses (*) silica gel as a solid stationary phase; and its “flash” variety was developed by W. Clark. Examples include ion exchange and high-performance liquid varieties. For 10 points— name this type of chromatography which performs the separation in a namesake vessel.**

answer: column chromatography (prompt on “chromatography”)

24. **One branch of this river mingles with the Sweetwater in Pathfinder Reservoir. Another tributary originates in the Mosquito Range and flows through Greeley and Sterling, while another goes through Goshen Hole and (*) Casper. Ultimately joining the Missouri, it also receives the Loup and the Elkhorn. For 10 points— name this river with North and South portions, which flows through Grand Island, Denver, and Omaha.**

answer: Platte River

25. **He originally named a place he found the Island of the True Cross, though his patron King Manuel changed the name later. Frosty relations with the zamorin of Calicut led to the second tragedy of his expedition, after a storm at the (*) Cape of Good Hope that killed his lieutenant Bartolomeu Dias. For 10 points— name this discoverer of Brazil, a Portuguese sailor who followed Vasco da Gama to India.**

answer: Pedro Cabral

26. **The simplest model for this phenomenon was developed by Dewar and is known as the PGT equation. When this feature is particularly strong in lakes, it can result in (*) shearing forces which cause oscillations between the epilimnion and hypolimnion, and vertical displacement of it can be caused by cyclones. Coinciding with the pycnocline, it's the layer past which density increases rapidly with depth. For 10 points— name this layer of water which marks a rapid decrease of temperature with depth.**

answer: thermocline

- A. Name this hunter and lover of Eos, who was put into the stars near his dog.
answer: Orion
- B. One version of the death of Orion says that he boasted of being able to kill anything produced by the Earth, at which point Gaia created a large one of these creatures.
answer: scorpion
- C. Orion's blindness was caused on this island, either by the treachery of its king Oenopion or by punishment for Orion raping Merope here.
answer: Chios
2. It is rate-limited by carnitine-assisted acyl coA transfer from cytosol into the matrix, a step inhibited by malonyl coA. For 10 points each—
- A. Also inhibited by NADH, name this process that converts fatty acids into acetyl coA for the Krebs cycle by the activity of thiolase on carbon-3.
answer: beta oxidation
- B. During seed germination, beta oxidation takes place in this plant organelle, providing acetyl coA that is converted to succinate for gluconeogenesis.
answer: glyoxysome
- C. This alternative to beta oxidation oxidizes the carbon farthest from the alpha carbon. Taking place in the ER, it produces dicarboxylic acids like adipate.
answer: omega oxidation
3. He appears as Cardinal Bon's pal in Elinor Wylie's *The Venetian Glass Nephew*. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this writer of such fairy tales as *The Snake Woman* and *Turandot*, who tried to bring back the commedia dell'arte and hated on Pietro Chiari, among others.
answer: Carlo Gozzi
- B. Chiari was accused of being a witch in this Gozzi play, which sees Tartaglia sent on a snipe hunt for the titular enormous citrus fruits. Prokofiev wrote an opera based on it.
answer: The Love for Three Oranges (or The Love of Three Oranges or L'amore delle tre melarance)
- C. Depicted as a magician in *The Love for Three Oranges* is this forward-looking contemporary of Gozzi, who wrote *The Mistress of the Inn* and *The Benificent Bear*.
answer: Carlo Goldoni

4. Name these Carribean islands, for 10 points each.
- A. This member of the Windward Islands has such fancifully named cities as Londonderry and Sans Soucis as well as the capital, Castries.
 answer: Saint Lucia
- B. Go twenty-four miles north of Saint Lucia and you will find this French-controlled birthplace of Empress Josephine, where yawl racing and cockfighting are popular.
 answer: Department of Martinique
- C. Union Island, Canouan, and Mayreau are some of the members of this syrupy island chain, which is paired with St. Vincent as an independent state.
 answer: the Grenadines
5. It is sung by Lauretta, who is seeking help from her father in an attempt to wed the recently disinherited Rinuccio. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this aria, which discusses going to Porta Rossa to buy a ring and has a title meaning "oh my dear daddy."
 answer: "O mio babbino caro"
- B. "O mio babbino caro" is a highlight of this opera, in which the title character masquerads as a dead man in order to create a will benefitting himself.
 answer: Gianni Schicchi
- C. *Gianni Schicchi* was composed by this guy, who may be better known for *Tosca*, *Madama Butterfly*, and *La Boheme*.
 answer: Giacomo Puccini
6. Charlie Fox and Bobby Gould maneuver to make a film production deal with Ross in this play. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this drama, also featuring the secretary Karen using sex to get her way.
 answer: Speed-the-Plow
- B. This author of *The Woods* and *Glengarry Glen Ross* wrote *Speed-the-Plow*.
 answer: David Mamet
- C. Don Dubrow conspires with "Teach" Cole to steal a valuable nickel in this David Mamet play.
 answer: American Buffalo
7. Name these attempts to avoid World War II, for 10 points each.
- A. This spring 1922 conference in Italy fruitlessly tried to forgive the Imperial Russian debt and institute normal relations between the Soviet Union and western Europe.
 answer: Conference of Genoa
- B. Turkey gave up claims to Arabia and the Dodecanese and opened up the Black Sea straits in this final peace treaty of World War I, signed in 1923.
 answer: Treaty of Lausanne
- C. This 1925 agreement ratified the inviolability of the Versailles borders and guaranteed French support for Germany's eastern neighbors.
 answer: Locarno Pact
8. She drew on her own life to depict sisterly strife in *A Summer Bird-Cage*. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this author of *The Middle Ground*, *The Ice Age*, and *The Waterfall*, who is also a noted editor of Jane Austen and literary reference works.
 answer: Margaret Drabble
- B. This sister of Margaret Drabble and author of *Shadow of a Sun* told about the affair between Randolph Ash and Christabel LaMotte in *Possession*.
 answer: Antonia Susan Byatt
- C. Byatt's study *Degrees of Freedom* is a critique of this writer of *Under the Net*, *A Severed Head*, and *The Sea, The Sea*.
 answer: Iris Murdoch

9. Answer the following about the interception of historical messages, for 10 points per part.
- A. Marian Rejewski and Alan Turing's Ultra group broke the code used by this German device to transmit messages in World War II.
 answer: Enigma machine
- B. This NSA project broke the KGB's code for contacting American spies in 1945, and used the decrypted messages to track down the Rosenbergs and others until 1980.
 answer: VENONA
- C. Written by the namesake Spanish ambassador, this letter insulting William McKinley was stolen by Cuban activists and given to the *New York Journal* in 1898.
 answer: De Lome letter
10. It begins with a beggar named The Zany beating a malicious colonel to death. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this novel in which the titular dictator of a Guatemala-like country ultimately breaks up the marriage of Camila and Angel Face.
 answer: El Señor Presidente
- B. Like *Men of Maize* and *The Strong Wind*, *El Señor Presidente* was written by this man.
 answer: Migual Angel Asturias
- C. Coming between *The Strong Wind* and *The Eyes of the Interred* in Asturias's Banana Republic trilogy, this novel's title figure is based on banana magnate Samuel Zemurray.
 answer: El Papa Verde or The Green Pope
11. They exchange gas through their cuticled body wall, and has a closed circulatory system with segmental branches separated by septa. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this phylum of animals that includes all segmented worms like the earthworm.
 answer: annelida
- B. Including the fanworm, this class of annelida has paddlelike parapodia that function in gas exchange and locomotion and have chitinous setae bristles.
 answer: polychaeta
- C. Named for a chemical that keeps the blood from coagulating, this class that includes the leeches has been used for bloodletting.
 answer: hirudinea
12. 2008 was supposed to be the year of the Atlantic 10 in college basketball. Oh well. For 10 points each—

 answer: University of Dayton
- C. A 14-1 start made this Kingston-based team, known as the Rams, an NCAA bubble contender. A 7-9 record in-conference made them fodder for Creighton in the NIT.
 answer: University of Rhode Island
13. It was addressed to Pope Sylvester I, who was said to have cured its namesake of leprosy. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this medieval forgery, which purported to affirm the Roman Emperor's gift of temporal supremacy to the Papacy.
 answer: Donation of Constantine (or Donatio Constantini; or Constitutum Constantini)
- B. Using linguistic analysis, the Donation of Constantine was proven false by this author of *On Pleasure* and *On Free Will*.
 answer: Lorenzo Valla or Laurentius Vallensis
- C. Valla also debunked the letters attributed to Jesus and addressed to this Edessan king.
 answer: Abgarus V Ukama

14. In 2006, supporters of Alexander Kozulin rallied in Yanke Kupala park against fixed elections in this country. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this country which, since 1996, has been allegedly forming a federation with Russia.
answer: Belarus
- B. Since 1994, Belarus has been ruled by this former anti-corruption official, a fan of hockey and combovers.
answer: Alexander Lukashenko
- C. Responsible for the Helsinki Accords and the Charter of Paris, this pan-ideological body monitored the 2006 Belarussian elections and found them faulty.
answer: OSCE or Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe
15. Much of this urban area's commerce takes place in nearby Cho Lon. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this city, renamed in 1976, which is home to the Cercle Sportif and was once the capital of South Vietnam.
answer: Thanh Pho Ho Chi Minh City
- B. Ho Chi Minh City is on this river, which receives the Dong Nai nearby and ultimately flows into Ganh Rai Bay to join the Mekong delta.
answer: Saigon River
- C. For ninety-eight years, the future Ho Chi Minh City was the capital of this French colonial entity, representing the part of Vietnam south of Annam.
answer: Cochinchina
16. Windows utilizes both its vectored variety and the structured variety, which in C++ employs the “finally” keyword. For ten points each—
- A. Identify this process of catching run-time failures in programming.
answer: exception handling
- B. Exception handling is more commonly handled in C++ and in Java with the use of this keyword, which delineates protected code. An exception then leads to a block delineated by the “catch” keyword.
answer: try
- C. This kind of exception occurs when a program attempts to access a block of memory not loaded in physical memory.
answer: page fault
17. Composed of *Anti-Oedipus* and *A Thousand Plateaus*, this two-volume work introduces such terms as “nomadology” and “deterritorialization.” For 10 points each—

- C. Deleuze also wrote about the “ism” of this “process philosopher” and “elan vital” proponent, who wrote *Laughter* and *Creative Evolution*.
answer: Henri Louis Bergson
18. A shadowy turban-wearing man holds a gun in the middle of this painting, while a sword-wielding rider is rearing his horse on the right. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this painting, depicting an 1822 event.
answer: Massacre at Chios
- B. *Massacre at Chios* was painted by this creator of *The Barque of Dante*.
answer: Eugene Delacroix
- C. This rough Delacroix painting shows the nude, red-haired title figure handcuffed to an object which is covered by a red and yellow garment.
answer: Andromeda

19. It results in a distortion of the crystal structure to eliminate degeneracies. For 10 points each—
- A. Identify this doubly-eponymous effect.
 answer: Jahn-Teller effect
- B. The Jahn-Teller effect is most often encountered in complexes with this geometry.
 answer: octahedral
- C. The instability of octahedral complexes and the existence of the Jahn-Teller effect can be mathematically proven by using these 32 groups which give the symmetries of crystals.
 answer: crystallographic point groups
20. It names Aristotle and Shakespeare as one type of person, and Plato and Dante as another. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this 1953 philosophical text, which divides people into symbolic animals that either "know many things" or "know one big thing."
 answer: The Hedgehog and the Fox
- B. This intellectual historian of *The Crooked Timber of Humanity* and a biography of Karl Marx wrote *The Hedgehog and the Fox*.
 answer: Isaiah Berlin
- C. Berlin's book *Two Studies in the History of Ideas* compares J.G. Herder to this Italian Enlightenment author of *The New Science*.
 answer: Giambattista Vico
21. He fought alongside Aegidius against the Visigoths at Orléans. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this son of Merovech and king of the Salian Franks, who may be best known for running off with Basina and having a famous son in 466.
 answer: Childeric I
- B. Childeric's famous son was this king who issued the Salic Law, Christianized Gaul, and founded a 200-year dynasty.
 answer: Clovis
- C. This dynasty founded by Clovis ruled in Gaul until Childeric III was deposed by his mayor of the palace, Pepin the Short, and they gave way to the Carolingians.
 answer: Merovingians
22. It includes Wii title *Radiant Dawn* and the Gameboy Advance volume *The Sacred Stones*. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this Intelligent Systems-developed series of strategy games, known for its use of a "weapon triangle."
 answer: Fire Emblem
- B. Also created by Intelligent Systems, this handheld-targeted series includes such entries as *Days of Ruin*, *Dual Strike*, and *Black Hole Rising*.
 answer: Advance Wars
- C. Another Intelligent Systems game, this GBA minigame title makes use of a "gyro sensor" and rumbling device and often requires you to turn the system 360 degrees.
 answer: WarioWare: Twisted
23. The first one of these to be discovered was 3C 273, and Maarten Schmidt explained it when he noted that its spectrum contained hydrogen lines with a redshift of 0.158. For 10 points each—
- A. Identify this class of bright, very distant objects.
 answer: quasars or quasi-stellar radio source
- B. The radio characteristics of quasars are very similar to those of these kinds of spiral galaxies, which have active nuclei and are very active in the infrared.
 answer: Seyfert galaxies
- C. The presence of hydrogen in the intergalactic medium results in old quasars having this transmission dip at sub-alpha Lyman wavelengths.
 answer: Gunn-Peterson trough

24. He concluded a rivalry with king Decebalus before naming Hadrian as his successor. For 10 points each—
- A. Name this Roman emperor who has a column and a bridge.
answer: Trajan or Caesar Divi Nervae Filius Nerva Traianus Optimus Augustus
- B. Decebalus was the king of this land, which was rebelling against Rome from its capital at Sarmizegethusa. It was the ancient name for what is now mostly Romania.
answer: Dacia
- C. This first of the Five Good Emperors re-established normalcy after the excesses of Domitian before adopting Trajan as his successor.
