Dear Graduates, Friends, and Family of the Inter-University Center,

Greetings! As executive director, allow me to wish you all the best in the holiday season from the staff at Stanford and in Yokohama, the faculty, and the consortium representatives.

As we approach our 50th anniversary and pass the landmark of 1,550 graduates, I am happy to report that the IUC is still engaged in the vital service of providing advanced language instruction to students planning for academic and professional careers that require mastery of Japanese. This past summer program enrolled 35 students, and our ten-month program—now well underway—is operating at near-full capacity with 45 students, from consortium and non-consortium schools, studying everything from law to literature.

We have been able to offer some form of scholarship to all 45 of our students this year, thanks to generous support from the Blakemore Foundation, the Richard U. Light Fellowship Program (for Yale students), the Cressant Foundation, the Hiroko Araki Fowler Scholarship Fund, the Sato Foundation, the FLAS program, the U.S. Department of Education's Fulbright Hays Group Project's Abroad, the College Women's Association of Japan, the Shoyu Club, the Tokyo Club, The UFJ Foundation, The America-Japan Society, the Ito Foundation USA, and an anonymous alumni donor. We are grateful for continued operation's support from the Japan-U.S. Friendship Commission, the U.S. Department of Education, the Japan Foundation and to the City of Yokohama for our classroom and office space. Financial contributions are always greatly appreciated. The conclusion of an outside review of the IUC conducted in 2005 ended with the following note of praise: "There is nowhere else in the world where students can receive the quality training the Center provides." All of us associated with the IUC of course agree, and share a strong commitment to the future.



This year marks the 45th year since the Center was established as an Inter-University Center, and my 21st year since I resigned from Yale to become Director. My tenure has spanned three terms: 1967 (ten years), 1995 (six years) and 2002 (five years). My current and final appointment ends in August of 2008. At that time I will be 78 years old and ready for a relaxed life with my wife. When I first became Director in 1967, there were no texts or methodology for teaching Japanese at the advanced level. And so, we started from scratch to develop an intensive forty-week program. One of our greatest strengths at the Center's conception was our core group of dedicated faculty. The Center has continued in this regard by attracting highly competent and dedicated teachers, and each year incremental (but significant!) improvements are made to the program.

I would like to express my appreciation to all of the people with whom I have worked over the years, both at the Center and in the field of Japanese studies in general.

Joined the IUC program in 1989, serving first as Instructor in both the ten-month and summer programs, then as Program Coordinator, going on to become Associate Director in 1999. His primary academic interests are in the area of linguistics, language education, and computer technology. He has taught in summer programs at Middlebury College and Tsukuba University and has given many talks and authored many articles in the fields of linguistics and language teaching pedagogy.
