


Faculty Contributions

As always, IUC faculty have been working tirelessly to meet the ever-changing needs of our students. This year, their work resulted in two major landmarks in Japanese language education:

- 1. a revised edition of the highly-acclaimed Kanji in Context; and
- 2. the digital publication of new language-teaching materials themed around the Japanese response to the Great East Japan Earthquake and Tsunami of March 11, 2011.

The latter publication – developed with a major grant from the United States-Japan Foundation and supplemental support from Stanford University – is available for free download to all.
